

Notice About 2026 Tax Rates

Property tax rates in Hansford Hospital District.

This notice concerns the 2026 property tax rates for Hansford Hospital District. This notice provides information about two tax rates used in adopting the current tax year's tax rate. The no-new-revenue tax rate would impose the same amount of taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. In most cases, the voter-approval tax rate is the highest tax rate a taxing unit can adopt without holding an election. In each case, these rates are calculated by dividing the total amount of taxes by the current taxable value with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

This year's no-new-revenue tax rate	\$0.499681/\$100
This year's voter-approval tax rate	\$0.560367/\$100

Unencumbered Fund Balance

Indigent Health Care Compensation Expenditures

The Hansford Hospital District spent \$82,011 from July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2026 on enhanced indigent health care at the increased minimum eligibility standards, less the amount of state assistance. For the current tax year, the amount of increase above last year's enhanced indigent health care expenditures is \$32,980.000000. This increased the voter-approval tax rate by 0.004916/\$100.

This notice contains a summary of actual no-new-revenue and voter-approval calculations as certified by Linda Cummings, Tax Assessor-Collector on 08/05/2026 .
